**Public Comment** Elizabeth Slusser addressed the council with her concern for the mental well being of the older population. She would like to use the circle park for activities such as croque, bands and taco Thursdays in the park. She is also asking council if they could use a city lot to relocate a community garden. Council supports both the use of city land for the community garden and the circle park for activities and advises Ms. Slusser that she should also talk to the Chamber of Commerce for help with organizing her pursuits.

**Public Hearing** Adoption of the FY 22 annual budget

Public hearing was opened at 6:11 by a motion from Mayor Testory.

The purpose of this hearing is to formally adopt the annual budget for the City of Farmer City for fiscal year beginning May 1, 2021 and ending April 30, 2022. After no discussion the public hearing was closed at 6:12 by a motion from McKinley. Seconded by Kelley. Voted unanimously. Motion carried.

**NEW BUSINESS** Ordinances and resolutions for initial consideration

1. Ordinance 2021-1062 an Ordinance adopting an annual budget for the City of Farmer City for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 2021 and ending April 30, 2022.  
City manager McLaughlin updated council on minor changes made to the budget from the last council meeting. She stated that the general fund will finish in the black by \$18,000.  
**MOTION** by McKinley to approve ordinance 2021-1062 an ordinance adopting an annual budget for the City of Farmer City for the fiscal year beginning May 1, 2021 and ending April 30, 2022. Seconded by Friedrich. Voted unanimously. Motion carried.

2. Approval of the bid to Stark Excavating for the Madison St drainage project in the amount of \$34,700.

This project will move a current storm sewer that is located in a resident's driveway and repeatedly fills with gravel.

**MOTION** by McKinley to approve the bid to Stark Excavating for the Madison St drainage project in the amount of \$34,700. Seconded by Kelley. Voted unanimously. Motion carried.

3. Approval of \$500 donation to the Chamber of Commerce for Farmer City promotional ads. Chamber president Curt Homann approached council requesting money to help pay for a 10–15-minute promotional piece for the Farmer City Raceway. The cost would be shared by the Chamber and will be used for production. Although the piece would be primarily raceway related, there would be 30 second spots throughout that would promote city businesses.

4. Approval of \$13,500 payment to the Illinois EPA to enter into a Consent Order with the Illinois Attorney General and Illinois EPA for settlement of an allegation regarding expiration of the City’s air emissions permit for electrical generating equipment.

This project was voted on and approved at the last council meeting at a lower cost. The price has increased by 33% due to more resin needed and the pipe being thicker than expected.

RE: Disorderly Conduct amendment

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The City Police department has recently experienced a high number of fighting calls, especially in the bars. Our current Disorderly Conduct ordinance does not specifically cite fighting as a cause for a disorderly conduct charge.

Chief Guest has requested that we amend the ordinance to add the proposed language in the ordinance addressing this. Staff recommends approval.

# ORDINANCE 1063

## AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE DISORDERLY CONDUCT PROVISION IN CHAPTER 132(A)

**WHEREAS;** the City of Farmer City is a municipality in accordance with the constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

**WHEREAS;** the City of Farmer City has the authority to enact ordinances addressing disorderly conduct in order to keep the peace; and

**WHEREAS;** the City of Farmer City desires to add Fighting to the list of what constitutes Disorderly Conduct.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Farmer City, DeWitt County, Illinois that:

That Chapter 132, Section 01(A), is amended as follows to add (13) and (14):

**Sec. 132.01 – Disorderly Conduct.**

- (13) Start a fight or Engages in a fight with another in the City
- (14) In a public or private place, engages in violent, abusive, indecent, profane, boisterous, unreasonably loud or otherwise disorderly conduct under circumstances in which the conduct tends to cause or provoke a disturbance

RE: Sex offender Failure to Register Fine

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The State of Illinois currently requires convicted sex offenders to register with the state and the police department. The state collects a \$100 registration fee but we currently have no "teeth" to ensure offenders register when living or moving into the City.

Chief Guest recommends implementing a \$150 fine for offenders who fail to register as an incentive to those who need to sign up. Staff recommends approval.



# ORDINANCE 1064

## AN ORDINANCE SETTING MINIMUM FINE FOR FAILURE TO REGISTER AS A SEX OFFENDER

**WHEREAS;** the City of Farmer City is a municipality in accordance with the constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

**WHEREAS;** the City of Farmer City has the authority to enact ordinances in furtherance of public safety and to prosecute violations of said ordinances; and

**WHEREAS;** the City has determined that it needs to maintain a sex offender registry with the state and city limits; and

**WHEREAS,** the City has determined that fining for the failure of a registered sex offender to register or renew registration is in its best interest.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Farmer City, DeWitt County, Illinois that:

First: That Title XIII General Offenses, Section 133 Offenses Against Public Justice and Administration, is amended by adding Section 133.04 as follows:

### **Sec. 133.04 – FAILURE TO REGISTER OR RENEW REGISTRATION AS A SEX OFFENDER.**

- (a) Failure to Register. A person who is required by law to register as a sex offender with the City of Farmer City Police Department shall do so on or by January 1 of each year but a person who fails to register when required shall be guilty of the offense of failure to register. A person guilty of failure to register shall be fined a minimum of \$150.00

RE: Accumulation of Refuse on Residential Property; Scrapping

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Currently the city's ordinance regarding depositing garbage on property is vague and needs updated. See current language below.

***91.19 PERMITTING OR DEPOSITING GARBAGE OR DEBRIS ON PROPERTY.*** *No person shall permit rubbish, trash, garbage, or other debris to remain on their property when, by so doing, same becomes a nuisance, or hazard to the enjoyment of other citizens of this city of their property or their life. No person shall deposit any garbage or other debris on the property of others, nor shall it be burned in the city.*

The updated language below defines what garbage is and will help the city better enforce the ordinances, clean up properties, and deter future violations.

**§ 91.19 PERMITTING OR DEPOSITING GARBAGE OR DEBRIS ON PROPERTY.**

*A. Definition: For purposes of this section, "garbage" shall be defined as any discarded, used, or unconsumed substance or waste. Garbage may include, but is not limited to, any trash, refuse, debris, rubbish, grass clippings, or other lawn or garden waste; newspaper,; magazines, glass, metal, plastic or paper containers, or other packaging, construction material, abandoned vehicle, motor vehicle parts, furniture, oil, carcass of a dead animal, nauseous or offensive matter of any kind, any object likely to injure any person or create a traffic hazard, or anything else of an unsightly or unsanitary nature which has been discarded, abandoned or otherwise disposed of improperly.*

*B. Depositing Garbage: No person shall dump, deposit, drop, throw, discard, leave, cause or permit the dumping, depositing, dropping, throwing, discarding, or leaving, of garbage upon any public or private property in the city, or upon or into any stream, lake, pond or other body of water in the city unless:*

*1. The property has been designated by the city or any of its agencies for the disposal of garbage, and the garbage is disposed of on that property in accordance with the applicable rules and regulations created by the city and Illinois Compiled Statutes; or*

*2. The person is acting pursuant to special cleanup days established by the city council; or*

*3. The person is lawfully acting in or reacting to an emergency situation where health and safety is threatened, and removes and properly disposes of any garbage when the emergency situation no longer exists.*

*Section 2. Section 91.20, entitled "Accumulation of Refuse on Residential Property" of Chapter 91, entitled "NUISANCES; ABANDONED VEHICLES", of the Farmer City Code, is added to read as set forth below:*

I am also recommending an ordinance that will help address people accumulating items on their property relating to scrapping. I am not against people that scrap for a

living; however, people in the scraping business tend to accumulate items on their property until they reach the point that the items become profitable. The amount of scrap accumulating can turn a property into a junk yard rather quickly. This ordinance was created by Toluca IL and was used to stop and clean up two properties. The ordinance was challenged in court and the city won and the properties were cleaned. The Judge did make a compromise in that case as the judge allowed the individuals to store the items on the property as long as the items were stored on a trailer. This ordinance addition will help the city better enforce the ordinances, clean up properties, and deter future violations

***§ 91.20 - ACCUMULATION OF REFUSE ON RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY; SCRAPPING***

*Prohibited Materials: It shall be unlawful to engage in scrapping and/or the accumulation upon any residential property within the city of any old, abandoned or unwanted metal, wood, glass, concrete, bricks, rubber, plastic, vinyl, slate, building material, roofing material, wrought iron, wiring, piping, copper tubing, aluminum (except aluminum cans), steel, auto parts or any other material that may be recycled or discarded for any purpose other than for the immediate discarding of such items as waste.*

Ordinance No. 1065

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An Ordinance Amending Chapter 91: Nuisances; Garbage

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**Whereas**, the City of Farmer City desires to have properties maintained in a clean and safe conditions; and

**Whereas**, the City Council for the City of Farmer City desires to bolster the existing nuisance ordinance by adding conditions to its definition of nuisances; and

**NOW, Therefore**, be it ordained by the Mayor and City Council of the City of Farmer City as follows, to-wit:

**Section 1.** Section 91.19, entitled "Permitting or Depositing Garbage or Debris on Property" of Chapter 91, entitled "NUISANCES; ABANDONED VEHICLES", of the Farmer City Code, as supplemented and amended, be and the same is hereby further supplemented and amended to read as set forth below:

§ 91.19 PERMITTING OR DEPOSITING GARBAGE OR DEBRIS ON PROPERTY.

A. Definition: For purposes of this section, "garbage" shall be defined as any discarded, used, or unconsumed substance or waste. Garbage may include, but is not limited to, any trash, refuse, debris, rubbish, grass clippings, or other lawn or garden waste; newspaper; magazines; glass, metal, plastic or paper containers, or other packaging; construction material; abandoned vehicle; motor vehicle parts; furniture; oil; carcass of a dead animal; nauseous or offensive matter of any kind; object likely to injure any person or create a traffic hazard; or anything else of an unsightly or unsanitary nature which has been discarded, abandoned or otherwise disposed of improperly.

B. Depositing Garbage: No person shall dump, deposit, drop, throw, discard, leave, or cause or permit the dumping, depositing, dropping, throwing, discarding, or leaving, of garbage upon any public or private property in the city, or upon or into any stream, lake, pond or other body of water in the city unless:

1. The property has been designated by the city or any of its agencies for the disposal of garbage, and the garbage is disposed of on that property in accordance with the applicable rules and regulations created by the city and Illinois Compiled Statutes; or
2. The person is acting pursuant to special cleanup days established by the city council; or
3. The person is lawfully acting in or reacting to an emergency situation where health and safety is threatened, and removes and properly disposes of any garbage when the emergency situation no longer exists.

**Section 2.** Section 91.20, entitled “Accumulation of Refuse on Residential Property” of Chapter 91, entitled “NUISANCES; ABANDONED VEHICLES”, of the Farmer City Code, is added to read as set forth below:

§ 91.20 - ACCUMULATION OF REFUSE ON RESIDENTIAL PROPERTY; SCRAPPING

Prohibited Materials: It shall be unlawful to engage in scrapping and/or the accumulation upon any residential property within the city of any old, abandoned or unwanted metal, wood, glass, concrete, bricks, rubber, plastic, vinyl, slate, building material, roofing material, wrought iron, wiring, piping, copper tubing, aluminum (except aluminum cans), steel, auto parts or any other material that may be recycled or discarded for any purpose other than for the immediate discarding of such items as waste.

**Section 3. Effective Date.** The provisions of this Ordinance shall become effective immediately following its passage, approval and publication as required by law.

**Section 4. Conflict.** All other ordinances or parts of ordinances which are in conflict with the provisions of this Ordinance are, to the extent of such conflict, hereby superseded.

**Section 5. Publication.** The City Clerk is hereby authorized and directed to cause this Ordinance to be published in pamphlet form immediately after passage.

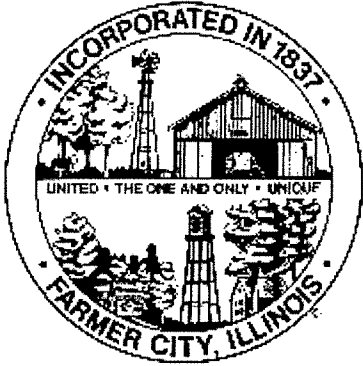

RE: Grass Height amendment

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The current ordinance regulating the height of grass before it needs to be mowed is 12". Chief Guest is recommending that we amend the ordinance to lower the maximum to 8".

He believes waiting until the grass is 12" is too late in an effort to keep lawns looking good. He states that 8" is about the point that grass appears to go from looking mowed to overgrown. Therefore, staff recommends amending the ordinance to 8".

# ORDINANCE 1066

## AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE GRASS HEIGHT IN CHAPTER 91: NUISANCES; WEEDS

**WHEREAS;** the City of Farmer City is a municipality in accordance with the constitution of the State of Illinois of 1970; and

**WHEREAS;** the City of Farmer City has the authority to enact ordinances addressing nuisances; and

**WHEREAS;** the City of Farmer City desires to reduce the allowable height for grass and weeds.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the City Council of the City of Farmer City, DeWitt County, Illinois that:

That Chapter 91, Section 31 Height, is amended as follows:

### **Sec. 91.31 - Height.**

- (31) It shall be unlawful for anyone to permit any weeds, grass or plants, other than trees, bushes, flowers or other ornamental plants to grow to a height exceeding 8 inches ~~12 inches~~ anywhere in the city, any such weeds, grass or plants exceeding the height are hereby declared to be a nuisance.

RE: Health Insurance Plan

The renewal date of our Health Insurance Plan is July 1, 2021. After reviewing the costs, we are currently paying \$306,540 per year for coverage. So, I reached out to Gallagher Insurance to see if they could help us find similar or the same coverage at a lower price. They were able to find that we could remain with Health Alliance and save more than \$40,000 per year. We've essentially cut out the middle man (State of Illinois).

This proposed new plan will allow our employees to keep the same doctors, same clinics and same hospitals. It will, however, save the City and the employees money overall. I have broken down the comparison in the following tables:
